

Tribute to Dr. Chris Healy

Chris Healy was a beloved professor who greatly impacted the University's College of Liberal Arts. Teaching English for more than twenty years until his retirement last year, his passions extended beyond the classroom.



He received his Ph.D. from Louisiana State University in 2002, specializing in Middle English literature, textual scholarship, and linguistics. His dissertation, "The 'Minor' Poet and the Major Editor: A Case Study in Canon Construction," examined the fiftieth-century poet Thomas Hoccleve's status outside the canon and how the textual tradition of his works affected the poet's reputation.

His academic feats were many, ranging from examining autobiographical material in Hoccleve's poetry to contributing to the *Chaucer Encyclopedia*. However, his passion for teaching was evident in the time he spent in the classroom with his students, mentoring the next generation of scholars.

The University, the College of Liberal Arts, and the students deeply miss his presence on campus. He passed away on August 21st, 2024.
